After months of delays, the Nickel City Line is the proud owner of an AC6000 locomotive. The locomotive was ordered in December of 2004 after profits from operations returned higher than expected dividends. The locomotive was scheduled to arrive in the first quarter of 2005, but production delays postponed delivery of the locomotive until the third quarter of 2005. Crews looked over the new arrival meticulously. After the inspection was completed, the locomotive was taken on a test drive through NCL territory. The unit performed flawlessly and met every challenge thrown at it. The locomotive was returned to the main locomotive shops in Nickel City where it will be prepped for painting and then lettering. The new locomotive number has not been determined at this time. However, once lettered and numbered, the unit is scheduled to be placed in service on Trains 200 and 203 in late fall.
